Stream of Consciousness

Much has been written about the environmental policies of the Bush Administration. Perhaps I am prejudiced: the magazines in which I read these very critical articles are environmental publications such as the Sierra Club Magazine, Fly Rod and Reel, Fly Fisherman, the national TU magazine and others.

On the other hand I do not read the publications of the oil drilling, mining or utilities industries. I would imagine that these journals are extolling the virtues of this Administration's environmental policies.

This week the administration came down squarely on behalf of the major ranchers and mining companies which would have faced increased costs if the (probably) endangered sage grouse were added to the list of endangered species. Since the Bush Administration refused to do so, the grouse habitat can be reduced further without consequence.

A month ago the Administration decided to include hatchery (Pacific) salmon in its population counts for the purpose of determining whether salmon runs in the northwest are endangered!

And on it goes.

I have seen pictures of Bush senior and of Bush junior holding striped bass as though they had caught Muslim terrorists. It is Bush senior who owns the world's largest menhaden "fishing" company. Its technique for obtaining these fish is to send its pilots over waters where runs are anticipated. If schools are spotted the barges can be sent in to scoop

up almost every last one of these oil rich little fish. I spoke with an innkeeper in Florida once who described watching a menhaden roundup. She was particularly distraught about all the big fish that were very confused at having their victuals taken away from them.

As environmentalists, we at Trout Unlimited have picked a topic that has dropped down on the list of Americans' primary concerns. And it may be a while before the public consciousness of such issues regains prominence.

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FLY OF THE MONTH The Stancev Wasp



Two years ago I watched Igor Stancev and his wife Nadia tie flies at the Somerset, New Jersey International Fly Tying Symposium. They hail from Macedonia. They tie both “fishing” and “realistic” flies. To me the fishing flies like this wasp (!) looked like works of art.

The body on this wasp is yellow tightly wound thread overlaid with black thread with paint and coating. I know this fly seems impractical, but some of you might want to tie a few

dozen. Give in to those neurotic tendencies and keep tying until you get it right!

As most of you know, the wasp is a popular summer terrestrial. I will tell you of a funny experience: I was fishing on the Wood River below a spot known as Tom's cabin. My wasp fly (not this one!) got snagged on brush on top of a rock. I waded over to retrieve my fly. When I got to the rock there was my fly right along side a dead wasp! Neither one did get eaten by a fish but I can picture the memorable coincidence almost as though I was there now.

Recipe

Hook: Standard dry fly hook #8 to #12

Thread: 8/0 black

Rib: Black thread.

Abdomen: Yellow polycrylic thread.

Thorax: Black fur dubbing covered with furry foam.

Wing: Grizzly hackle tips.

Hackle: Dyed yellow deer hair.

Head: Black tying thread.

Antennae: Black herl of cock tail feather.
